

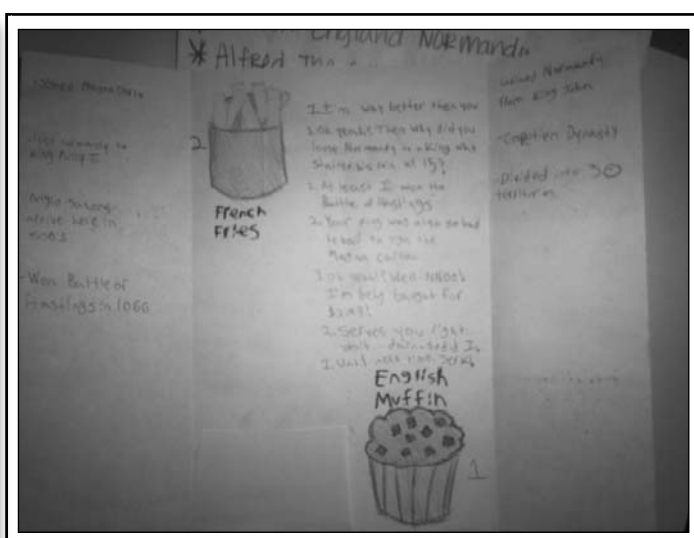
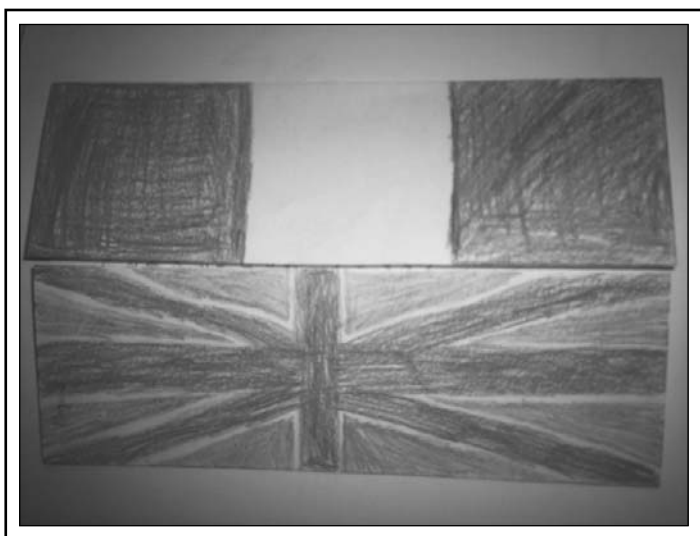
CARTOON CONVERSATION— WORLD HISTORY



Cartoon Conversations is an excellent strategy to promote deeper and broader thinking from your students. It works especially well in history classes where historical figures can “talk” and “debate” each other. The figures can be from the same time frame, but that is not necessary. Many teachers find it valuable to use figures from different time periods as long as there is some sort of thematic connection.



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It is not necessary to use people in Cartoon Conversations. Teachers can have inanimate objects or ideas converse and debate as if they have human capabilities as long as the student creates an icon to represent the object or idea. In this case, Haley Paul has her students use England and France as the two subjects in their Cartoon Conversations.

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
